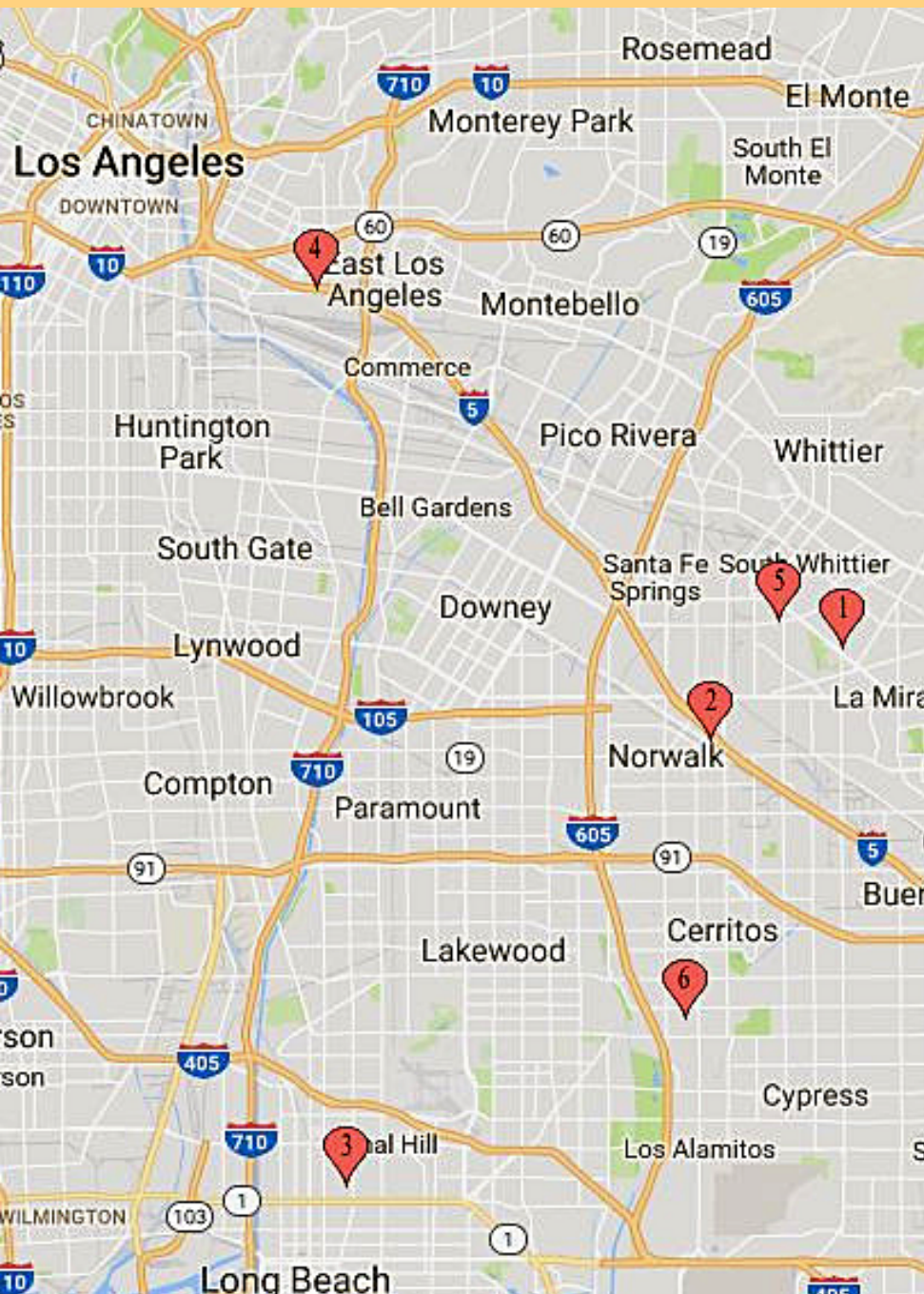

Every day, HYC helps people build their skills and success through compassionate counseling and supportive services. Kayla and Eva are just two of our clients who reached goals they set this year.

We are so proud of them both as they look forward to even brighter futures!

## WITH HYC'S HELP...

### A TEEN FINDS HER VOICE

Kayla\*, 13, was being bullied at school by another girl who made her life a daily ordeal by pulling her hair in class and stealing her lunch. Upon starting counseling services in HYC's Family Services Program, Kayla was afraid, depressed and unsure of herself. This was not the first time she had been bullied, and she didn't think she would ever escape it; she had also endured bullying throughout elementary school. She was scared to confront her bully and feared being labeled a "tattletale". It took time, but Kayla built a trusting bond with her HYC counselor during weekly individual counseling sessions. With her counselor's help, Kayla learned and practiced positive communication skills. She first spoke with a teacher about what was happening, which was a huge step as it was something she was hesitant to do before.

Kayla's confidence and communication skills continued to grow through counseling and she was able to have a non-aggressive conversation with her bully, letting her know that she did not like it when she stole her lunch and pulled her hair. With this success, Kayla's self-esteem soared. Her positive communication style blossomed with classmates, teachers, and family. HYC is thankful for being able to help Kayla find her voice and the confidence to stand up for herself in an effective way!

### A SENIOR FINDS A SAFE HOME

Eva\*, 65, was vulnerable, alone and ill with several chronic health conditions after she suddenly found herself homeless. Her terrifying and disorienting experience began when her 25-year-old son came to visit her at her apartment and got into an altercation with the security guard. The incident was so disruptive that Eva was served with a three-day notice to vacate. In crisis, she turned to the streets. She slept in parks in the city of Huntington Park while searching for an apartment she could afford, constantly fearing for her safety and dreading night time. Because of her limited SSI income, she found it extremely difficult to find a place to rent, especially with all the initial costs. HYC Homeless Services Program staff encountered an exhausted and fearful Eva during street outreach in Huntington Park. She was receptive to receiving services and HYC teamed with Bell Shelter to help her with immediate shelter and basic needs.

After leaving the shelter, HYC helped Eva find a permanent one-bedroom apartment, including assisting her with the security deposit and basic household necessities. Eva cherishes her new apartment! This wonderful lady is safe at home and grateful to HYC for all the support she received in her time of greatest need.

# AGENCY ACCOMPLISHMENTS



Helpline Youth Counseling (HYC) delivered direct services to a total of **5,471 children, youth and adults** from its headquarters location at Liberty Community Plaza in Unincorporated South Whittier, five satellite offices in East Los Angeles, Hawaiian Gardens, Long Beach, Norwalk, and Whittier, in client homes and community locations, and on **78 elementary, middle, and high school campuses** in **19 school districts** throughout Southeast Los Angeles County and Long Beach.



**Our continuum of prevention, early intervention, treatment and aftercare services included** case management; individual, group and family mental health counseling; youth and adult substance use services; Visions Learning Center, our therapeutic day treatment school; gang intervention and induction prevention; life skills, conflict resolution, anger management and parenting classes; health care outreach, education, enrollment and retention services; economic development and community organizing; basic needs support for families; and homelessness and housing assistance. **HYC integrates our services with community partner organizations and our interagency continuum of care.**



**Liberty Community Plaza (LCP) served as a destination hub** for educational, health and wellness, arts and cultural programming usually found in more affluent areas. HYC worked in close collaboration with the County of Los Angeles, 4th Supervisorial District (building owner) and **34 on-site partner organizations** to develop and manage LCP programming providing local residents and HYC clients with opportunities to build their strengths, skills, and support networks.

Our Homeless Services Program assisted a total of **447 homeless men, women and children** to transition from the streets to stability by delivering permanent housing placement, rental assistance, comprehensive case management, linkages to basic needs resources, and transportation in partnership with the City of South Gate, People Assisting The Homeless (PATH) and the Gateway Cities Council of Governments (COG).

Long Beach Advocates for Change (LBAFC), our large-scale community organizing project funded by The California Endowment, **mobilized more than 1,000 Central Long Beach adults and youth** to decrease violence and increase health and safety in the community adjacent to Martin Luther King, Jr. Park.



A total of **172 households** were assisted in filing for and receiving federal and state income tax refunds through the Community Tax Center HYC operated at LCP in partnership with South Bay Center for Counseling (SBCC). Adults coming to the Center received free tax preparation services, financial literacy assistance and connection to mainstream banking services.

HYC increased agency total current assets from **\$1,482,756 to \$1,685,634 as of June 30, 2018**. Unrestricted net assets increased from **\$901,726 to \$925,214**. HYC maintained **\$170,509** in its operating reserve account at year end, helping ensure the ongoing financial health and vitality of the agency.

# AGENCY STATISTICS & IMPACT

## HYC INTEGRATED CONTINUUM OF CARE

**2,931** Community Services Provided

Community Services staff provide at-risk youth and their parents and caregivers with counseling, treatment and support services to deter youth from gang affiliation, delinquent behavior, dropping out of school, substance abuse, and entering the juvenile justice system. HYC Community Services also include homeless prevention and outreach services, placement into permanent housing, and housing stabilization services.

**1,784** Family Services Provided

Family Services staff provide children, youth and adults with counseling, case management, intensive home-based interventions, parenting education, and on-site education and therapeutic day treatment to reduce child abuse, domestic violence and juvenile delinquency.

**756** Clinical Services Provided

Clinical Services staff provide therapy and clinical interventions to youth and adults utilizing trauma-informed care and evidence-based and promising practices. Prevention and early intervention are an important part of HYC's mental health services.

## FAMILY PRESERVATION PROGRAM

The HYC Family Preservation (FP) Program provides intensive, home-based intervention to families at risk of or experiencing child abuse/neglect to increase child safety and family stability and avert the removal of children from their homes. Our program utilizes the evidence-based Family Assessment Form (FAF) to assess family progress and success. Questions on the FAF correspond to the Five Protective Factors have been demonstrated to reduce the likelihood of child abuse and neglect.



**HYC FP Program families showed average improvements in the following 5 domains of family functioning after 3 months of participation**

**3%** Parental Resilience (PR)

**6%** Knowledge of Parenting and Child Development (KPCD)

**1.8%** Social Connections (SC)

**7%** Social/Emotional Competence of Children (SECC)

**2.6%** Concrete Support in Times of Need (CSTN)

HYC provides comprehensive Domestic Violence Services to assist mothers and their children who are previously or currently experiencing domestic and family violence, including physical, verbal, emotional, economic and sexual abuse.

In FY 2017-18, our program including intensive case management, counseling, cycle of violence education, life skills training, and employment readiness assistance helped families to find safety and begin the journey toward stability and independence.

We helped mothers overcome barriers to self-sufficiency aggravated or caused by domestic abuse, including limited knowledge of the characteristics of healthy relationships, social isolation and lack of a support system, the impact of domestic violence on their children, lack of a diploma or GED, and limited work experience.

All participants enrolled in individual, family or group counseling and received legal, housing, educational and/or employment referral assistance to remove barriers to self-sufficiency.

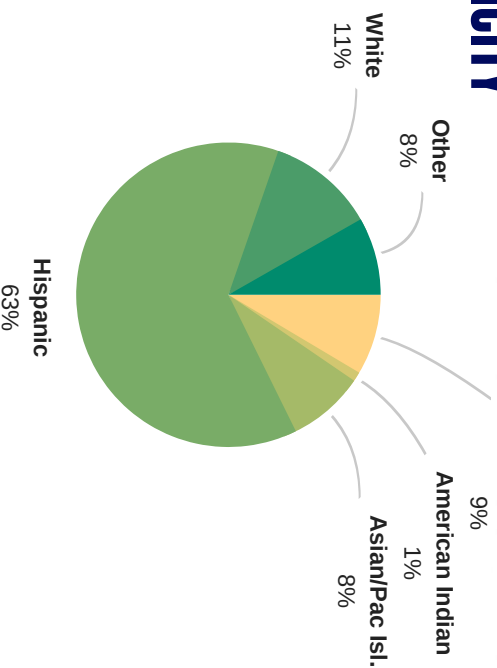

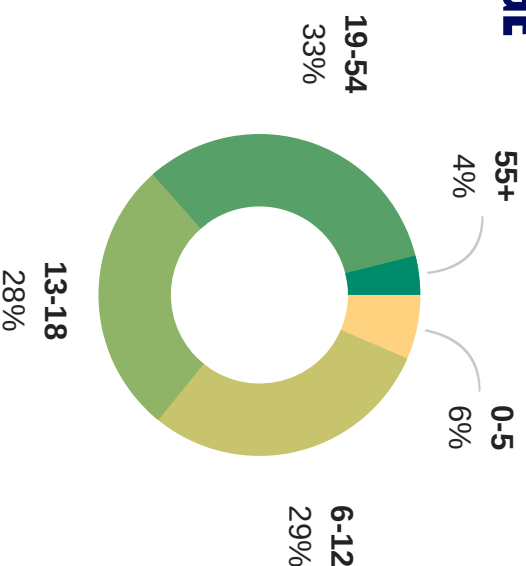
